## 10. STABILITY AND REACTIVITY

## 10.1 Reactivity

Aluminium oxide is chemically amphoteric (behaves as a weak acid in the presence of base and as a weak base in the presence of acid). May act catalytically.

### 10.2 Chemical stability

Stable under recommended conditions of storage.

## 10.3 Possibility of hazardous reactions

Aluminium oxide may cause the exothermic polymerization of ethylene oxide. May cause the vigorous polymerization of vinyl chloride.

## 10.4 Conditions to avoid

Avoid heat, sparks, open flames and other ignition sources.

# 10.5 Incompatible materials

Incompatible with chlorine trifluoride (reacts violently, forming flame) and ethylene oxide (polymerises violently). Dissolves slowly in alkaline solutions.
